

Siberia, Beringia, and the Peopling of the Americas—Kelly Graf (University of Kansas)

Traditionally, peopling of the Americas studies focused on questions of when and from where initial human migration to the Western Hemisphere took place. Researchers have argued for arrival as early as before the last glacial maximum to as late as 14,000–13,000 years ago, coinciding with the origins of the Clovis archaeological tradition, and for a founding population from Northeast Asia, Southeast Asia, or even Europe with



people crossing the Bering Land Bridge, skirting the Pacific coasts, and/or boating across the Pacific and Atlantic oceans. New developments in ancient human genomic studies provide a framework for better understanding the tempo and geography of first peoples' arrival. Documentation of several paleogenomes from late Pleistocene and early Holocene contexts indicate an initial migration from Northeast Asia through Beringia to the Americas. Here, we will explore the archaeological record of northern regions within a paleogenomics context to help fill in gaps in our understanding of the dispersal process to the Americas.
